A result of the Globethics.net International Conference
Bangkok, Thailand, 22-26 September 2005

In today's globalised and interconnected world, most societies are challenged by a fast transition of structures and values. Therefore, former models, guidelines and practices of leadership are changing. The call for ethical orientation for responsible leadership is widespread.

'Responsible Leadership - Global and Contextual Ethical Challenges' was the topic addressed at the International Globethics.net Conference, 22-26 September 2005 in Bangkok, Thailand. The participants explored elements of principles for responsible leadership in five areas, namely family, education, religion, business and politics. The principles outlined in this paper represent the outcome of the Bangkok conference.

The participants, mostly ethicists, came from 22 countries in five continents in the South and North. They shared concerns and issues of crisis in leadership in various fields and different social, political, economic and religious contexts. Five keynote speeches and 25 papers were discussed in workshops and showed common concerns such as poverty and wealth, war and violence, lopsided development, the speed of transforma-

Key values and recommendations of the Globethics.net International Conference Bangkok, 22-26 Sept 2005.

1. Responsible Family Leadership

- «family leadership is love understood as action»
- mutual respect, uniqueness of each family member
- participatory family management

Questions: gender equality, hierarchical versus democratic family models, multicultural differences within families?

2. Responsible Educational Leadership

- education versus schooling
- Culturally rooted education
- Critical education
- Value-based and not market-driven education

Questions:

Private versus public educational institutions: which prepares better for responsible leadership?

- excellency-pressure: leads it more to one-sided competition instead of community-oriented holistic leadership?

3. Responsible Religious Leadership

within faith-based organisations

- faithful to the spiritual tasks of a religious leader
- On the side of the weaker
- Transparency and accountability

In relation with the state

- Ensure mutual respect
- Legislation protecting religious rights

Questions: *religious leaders free from political, ethnic, financial pressure? Accountable and corruption-free?*

4. Responsible Business Leadership

- stakeholder orientation
- Responsible for financial, social, environmental stability
- Respecting ethical values wherever a company acts
- Balancing public and private interests

Questions: *How to respect the societies expectations and not only shareholders and competitors/peers?*

How to establish trust and - e.g. as wealthy persons - remain connected to reality or «normal» people?

5. Responsible Political Leadership

- To promote peace, sovcial security
- To promote transparency, accountability
- To empower active cirizens and enable participation
- To be self-critical leader with a sense for spirituality
- To keep promises

Questions: How can democracy avoid election of populist leaders without values (with the only goal to be elected»? How to make political leaders accountable? How to overcome ethnic power struggles?

6. Responsible Media Leadership

- To develop a critical holistic perspective of media
- To use internet to promote real rather than virtual communities
- To defend the interests of the weaker of the society

Questions: *How to strengthen media de-centralisation and avoid global centralised media monopoly? How to strengthen professional ethics of media owners, media investors, journalists, librarians, archivists, consumers/ producers (citizens journalists)?*
